



**Plymouth Trees Felled** Recently, in Plymouth, over 100 mature trees were felled overnight to make way for a £12.7m pedestrian walkway, despite significant local opposition and a petition with more than 16,000 signatures. Wishing paralegal, Megan Tyson, every success


ELF is very sad to be saying goodbye to Megan Tyson, who has been a steadfast paralegal working with ELF for over a year. Megan first joined


ELF in May 2021 and stayed for a year, returning at the end of 2022 when her planned role at the Foreign Office was postponed. Megan is


